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Foreword

TICAD9 was held in Yokohama from August 20 to 22, 2025, under the theme "Co-create innovative solutions with Africa."

Looking back over TICAD's history spanning more than 30 years, Japan has consistently worked as a partner with African nations on development, always on equal footing. During this time, the needs expressed by African countries have changed significantly, and I often sense that the era of aid has passed, and we have entered an era of investment. Business exchanges flourished at this TICAD as well, with over 300 MOUs reportedly signed. Nevertheless, to support these businesses and guide them toward sustainable success, foundational infrastructure, basic education, and fundamental healthcare services accessible to all Africans remain insufficient. The Association of African Economy & Development (AFRECO) held two seminars at TICAD9 on healthcare and basic education; both were nearly full, indicating high interest. Business alone may not yet make Japan a good partner for Africa.

I am grateful that member companies and individuals from diverse fields support AFRECO's operations, which include construction, academia, healthcare, consulting, finance, power industry, and more - truly a wide range. At this TICAD, where the business focus grew even stronger, I reaffirmed that AFRECO has two key roles to help our members succeed in Africa.

First, I need to strengthen connections between member companies and individuals across sectors. Entering Africa solely within one's own field presents significant hurdles. It holds for many developing nations advancing their development now, as they must simultaneously address various challenges—such as sustainability, improving the natural environment, and reducing disparities—beyond just pursuing development. AFRECO may be called upon to connect members more effectively and initiate "co-creation" than ever.

The other is the need for activities that encourage support for the provision of basic infrastructure, basic education, and fundamental healthcare services across all of Africa. AFRECO members need to be able to dedicate themselves to their business in Africa fully. To do so, support from the member companies is necessary, but advocacy and lobbying efforts directed at governments are also indispensable.

Focusing on supporting business development and promoting improvements in social life in Africa, I will strive with all my strength until the commemorative 10th TICAD.

【Co-Creating the Future of Healthcare and the Economy: Japan-Africa Public-Private Partnerships at the Forefront】

5-minute presentation by FUKUNAGA Tetsuya, AFRECO Counselor



As an example of public-private collaboration addressing health challenges in Africa, FUKUNAGA Tetsuya, Counselor, explained the project "Improving Medical and Healthcare Services with Mobile Technology ~ To Strengthen the Infrastructure for Medical Information." This project, scheduled to commence in Kenya this September with funding from the African Development Bank's (AfDB's) Policy and Human Resource Development Grant, will be implemented by AFRECO.

First, Ms. Hendorina Doroba, Manager of the Education and Skills Development Division at the AfDB, provided an overview of the AfDB Group and its perspective on Africa's healthcare systems. Subsequently, Fukunaga announced that this project will be developed in partnership with the Faculty of Medicine at Jomo Kenyatta University of Agriculture and Technology, alongside member companies G-Cube Co., Ltd. and Qunie Corp. The project aims to achieve four objectives, identifying challenges and issues along the way, ultimately leading to policy and institutional recommendations. (See attached reference material)

Dr. Peter L. Ogwang Ogwang, the AfDB's project manager for this initiative, also participated in this seminar. On August 23, we reaffirmed the project's future direction.

This seminar was nearly at full capacity, graced by H.E. Mr. KUROIWA Yuj, the Mayor, and Mr. SHUTO Kenji, the Vice Mayor of Kanagawa Prefecture. The main themes were the following three points: 1) Introduction to the activities of the TOKUSHUKAI Group; 2) Introduction to AFRECO's activities; and 3) Report on the Triangular Training program in Tunisia, realized through cooperation between JICA, TOKUSHUKAI, and AFRECO.



1) TOKUSHUKAI Group Activities

The TOKUSHUKAI Group practices the philosophy of its late founder, Torao Tokuda, who believed that "all living beings are created equal," in the medical field. Its mission is to build a society where anyone can receive the best medical care at any time, anywhere.

It provides medical support not only within Japan but also in 42 countries worldwide. In Africa, it has donated 171 dialysis machines to 17 countries and guided the operation of

dialysis centers, primarily under the leadership of Dr. Shuzo Kobayashi, Director of Shonan Kamakura General Hospital. Training itself involves either inviting medical staff (doctors, nurses, medical engineers) or having TOKUSHUKAI Group doctors and others travel to Africa.

As an extension of this, since 2018, it has been developing a kidney transplant project with the University of Dodoma and Benjamin Mkapa General Hospital in Tanzania. With the cooperation of Tokyo Women's Medical University Hospital, kidney transplants performed by African medical

staff have been successful. The project is currently underway to establish a transplant center at Benjamin Mkapa General Hospital. Other initiatives include support for the Kinshasa Police Hospital in the Democratic Republic of the Congo and Queen Mamohato Memorial Hospital in the Kingdom of Lesotho, among countless others.

Furthermore, this year, Shonan Kamakura General Hospital was selected as one of Japan's best hospitals by Newsweek magazine in the United States.



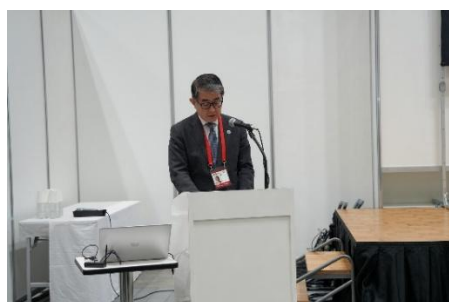
2) AFRECO Activities

Following TICAD V, AfDB began receiving various inquiries regarding African healthcare from African ambassadors in Tokyo and medical professionals active in Africa. Consequently, during TICAD VI, it hosted a side seminar titled "Communication Paradigm of the Japanese Doctors/Researchers Working in the Sub-Saharan African Nations." Subsequently, study sessions based on this seminar continued until TICAD VII. In 2017, AFRECO advised the Cabinet Secretariat to establish an "Africa Health and Wellbeing Initiative (AfHWIN)," leading to the announcement of the "Basic Policy for AfHWIN" in 2019.

Concurrently, AFRECO signed an MOU with the Faculty of Medicine at the University of Dodoma in Tanzania and is advancing the introduction of medical equipment in collaboration with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Furthermore, with the cooperation of the member company, Clinical Engineering Global Promotion Foundation, a Bio-medical Engineering Course will commence at the University of Dodoma this fall. In Kenya, an MOU was signed with the Faculty of Medicine at Jomo Kenyatta University of Agriculture and Technology. With support from the African Development Bank, plans are underway to enhance medical and health services in Kenya using mobile technology, in collaboration with member companies, G Cube and Qunie.

Furthermore, SOIK is supporting and collaborating with member companies such as SOIK and Warrantee to invigorate activities in the medical field.

3) Triangular Training in Tunisia by JICA, collaborated with TOKUSHUKAI and AFRECO



Rheumatic heart disease remains widespread in Africa, with many young patients, particularly women of childbearing age, suffering from heart failure. 60% of these patients have mitral valve stenosis, for which percutaneous transvenous mitral commissurotomy (PTMC) is considered the optimal solution (treatment). This method is minimally invasive, making it suitable for pregnant women, and patients can walk out of the hospital the next day. The catheter used for this PTMC is the Inoue Balloon, developed in Japan, manufactured by Toray Industries, Inc., and sold and exported by Toray Medical.



AFRECO, together with Toray Medical, aims to spread the Inoue Balloon and its technology throughout Africa. At TICAD8, with Tunisia as the hub and support from JICA, 14 doctors from 12 countries were invited and attended the workshop on Inoue Balloon. The positive response encouraged both the Tunisian and Japanese governments to continue supporting this initiative. Consequently, from fiscal year 2025 to 2027, JICA will host an annual triangular

training program titled "Cardiology for Africa" in Tunisia. The goal extends beyond the Inoue Balloon; it aims to transfer essential Japanese knowledge and technology in cardiology and cardiovascular medicine to African nations in the future.

The first session of the triangular training program was held in July 2025, with 13 physicians from 7 countries in attendance. It was conducted under the guidance of Dr. Shigeru Saito at TOKUSHUKAI Group Shonan Kamakura General Hospital. Following the first session, Dr. Saito noted that while acknowledging the effectiveness of PTMC, the challenge lies in training physicians capable of performing catheter procedures, especially as atherosclerotic heart diseases, such as angina and myocardial infarction, are projected to increase dramatically in Africa. Continuously developing each triangular training program, combining lectures with practical skills training, will be key to Japan's future medical support for Africa.

Q&A



The Global Partnership for Education (GPE) is an international cooperation agency for basic education established under the World Bank. It is a fund that raises money to help developing countries strengthen basic education and provides mechanisms to assist in building education systems. At AFRECO, at the request of H.E. former Tanzanian President Kikwete, Chair of the GPE Board, we have been supporting GPE's activities in Japan since early summer 2024.

At TICAD9, we heard from various stakeholders focusing on school meals.



Hunger and poor health in Africa continue to be barriers to learning for millions of children. School meals can help overcome these barriers, improving learning outcomes, increasing school attendance rates, and ultimately contributing to a reduction in inequality. Japan's school meal system, which has been in place for over 100 years, offers valuable lessons. It has been referenced and implemented in many developing countries, such as Ghana and Madagascar, through MEXT and JICA. By collaborating with multilateral platforms like GPE, Japan's individual initiatives can significantly amplify their impact.

The First Lady of Kenya shared footage of her own activities, highlighting efforts that extend beyond providing school meals. These include growing vegetables for the meals at the schools themselves and supporting children in cultivating vegetables at home. She emphasized that such activities are not charity but investments in the future. Liberia's Minister of Education pointed out that whether or not school meals are provided affects children's enrollment rates. She also introduced local initiatives to source food locally, which empower women and keep children healthy and diligent. She spoke powerfully about how small efforts create significant change, echoing the Japanese proverb "Even dust, when piled up, can become a mountain."

GPE plans a replenishment meeting next year. At the previous replenishment meeting five years ago, the Japanese government pledged the lowest amount among the G7 nations, a relatively modest commitment. Japan, facing severe population decline, will inevitably need the support of African people. To avoid regret, then, we must invest in the education of African children now. It is not charity, but an investment in the future.

In African countries, non-communicable diseases (NCDs) pose a major challenge alongside infectious diseases, just as they do in Japan. Maintaining awareness of one's physical condition, eating a proper diet, and engaging in moderate exercise can help prevent NCDs. It is also crucial to establish systems that provide high-quality medical services at affordable prices. With this perspective, AFRECO introduced four member companies whose technologies, knowledge, and methodologies could offer insights to support Africa's healthcare. The four companies are TOKUSHUKAI Group, which is not only active in hospital management but also in support activities across Africa; G-Cube and SOIK, which manufacture medical devices and systems; and Warrantee, which is beginning activities in the field of healthcare finance and insurance.

Following the seminar mentioned held on August 21st, many people specifically visited the booths, providing each company with an opportunity to communicate their respective products and concepts.

In African countries, non-communicable diseases (NCDs) are as big a problem as infectious diseases, just as they are in Japan. It goes without saying that people can prevent NCDs to a certain extent by eating a balanced diet, exercising regularly, undergoing regular checkups at nearby medical facilities, and understanding their own bodies. And if they know that they can receive high-quality medical care at reasonable prices even if they do become seriously ill, they will feel more secure.

So where should you start? Here are AFRECO's four member companies that can provide some useful hints.

アフリカ諸国でも感染症だけではなく、我が国と同じように非感染性疾患が大きな課題だ。本人が適切な量と質の食事に気を配り、適度な運動して、身近な医療施設で定期的に検診を受け、己の体をちゃんと理解しておくことで、被感染性疾患もある程度予防できることは言うまでもない。そして万一深刻な病になっても質の高い医療サービスを手頃な値段で受けられることがわかっていれば安心だ。そのためには何から始めればいいのか。ここにヒントとなる当協会会員企業から4社を紹介する。

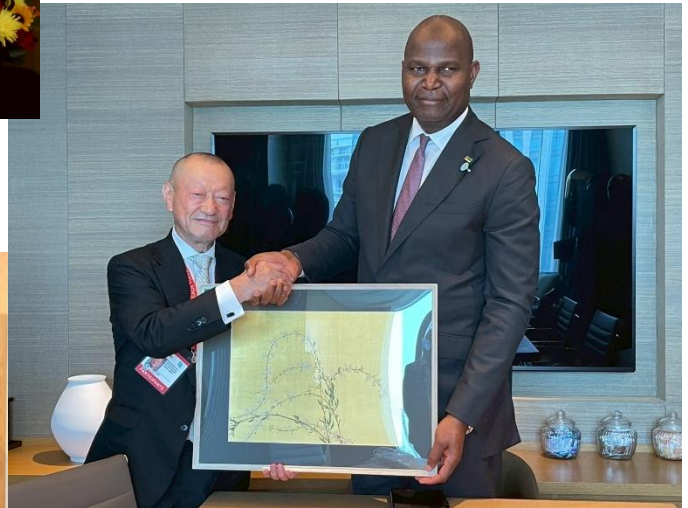

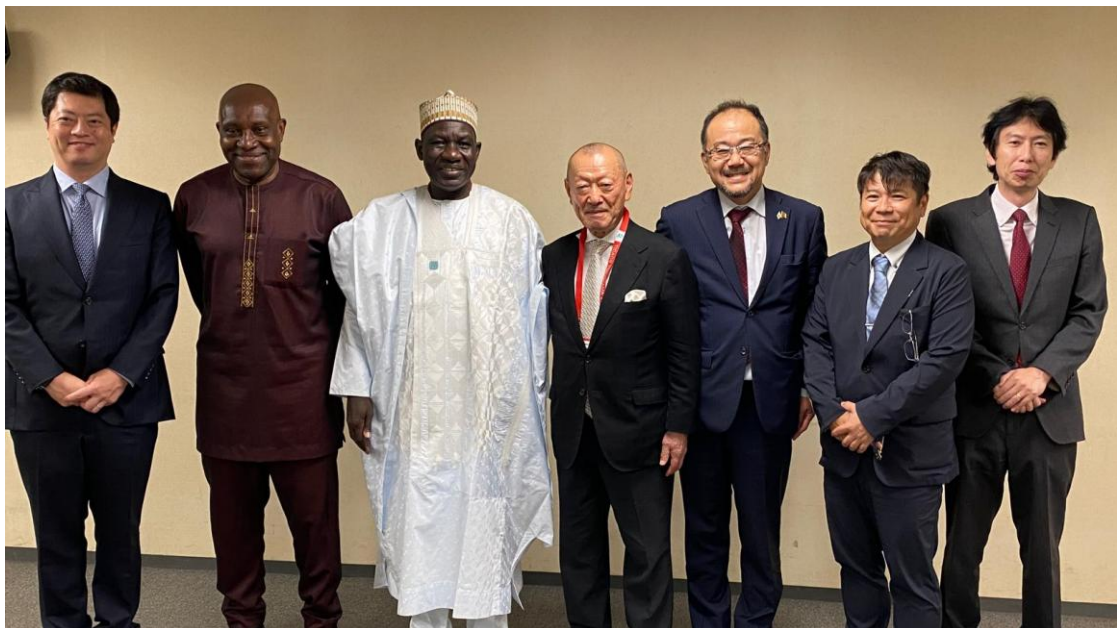

While holding some study sessions on healthcare and implementing projects in Africa, we proposed the concept of AfHWIN to the Cabinet Secretariat in 2018. In this project, we propose appropriate policies and funding sources and introduce a medical platform and products developed by our member companies to JKUAT.

G CUBE CO., LTD.

We are a life science company specializing in advanced diagnostics. We develop, manufacture, and supply gut microbiota tests, SNP analysis, and in vitro diagnostic kits for infectious diseases. In this project, we provide ovulation and urine glucose/protein test kits and the platform to record and analyze results.

QUNIE Corporation

QUNIE will propose and support the implementation of digital strategies tailored to local needs to address healthcare issues in Kenya and Africa. We will support the establishment of business models and their implementation in the field, thereby contributing to the realization of sustainable healthcare.

Jomo Kenyatta University of Agriculture and Technology (JKUAT)


JKUAT, established in 1981 by the governments of Kenya and Japan, plays a crucial role in strengthening Kenya's health system, providing the government with specialized knowledge and tools to achieve UHC. JKUAT will involve both fieldwork and the analysis of health systems and policies in this project.

Background of Partnership

Experts in healthcare, mobile technology, data processing, and finance have collaborated to initiate this project to bring sustainable reform while raising public awareness. This initiative addresses funding shortages and resistance to external systems through cross-sectoral expertise and partnership.

Synergy created through partnership

Once fieldwork begins this summer, patients will become an integral part of the collaboration. With a new tool, they can manage their health. Hospitals and JKUAT can conduct evidence-based decision-making. Additionally, the government can present e-health policy outcomes and implement appropriate projects.



To Strengthen the Infrastructure for Medical Information

Healthcare connectivity through mobile technology

Through hospitals, patients will receive testing kits. Results will be photographed using mobile phones and transmitted to hospitals. JKUAT will analyze data to identify trends, improve patient care and evidence-based decision-making, supporting the MOH's response strategies. We will also explore the gap between health policy objectives and the situation, propose appropriate policies and funding sources.

Description of Details of Public Scheme

AfDB has guided us in developing the content and pledged financial assistance. This enables Japan to transfer technology to JKUAT, which can serve as an inspection center, allowing the government to expand this initiative throughout Kenya.
